

## "Just one person I can call anytime" Campaigning for guardianship for child victims of trafficking

In July 2009, ECPAT UK and The Body Shop launched a joint campaign to combat child trafficking. To celebrate the second year of the campaign, ECPAT UK and the Body Shop have launched a petition calling on the UK Government to introduce a system of guardianship for child victims of trafficking.

A system of guardianship is a practical solution which will ensure better protection and support for children. We need as many people as possible to sign up to this petition to prove to the Government that there is strong public support for guardianship.

The petition was launched with a wave of public and parliamentary activities throughout the week, including a march to Parliament led by 'lollipop ladies and gentlemen', stopping the traffic to raise awareness of the campaign.

In The Body Shop stores across the UK staff are asking customers to sign the petition, draw their handprints to show their support, and buy the special campaign product 'Soft Hands, Kind Hearts' hand cream, proceeds from which support ECPAT UK projects.

The campaign has attracted high profile supporters from the UK and beyond with stars such as Joanna Lumley, Rob Lowe, Matt LeBlanc, Robert Pattinson, Sienna Miller, Yoko Ono, Jamie Oliver, Sir Ben Kingsley, Claudia Winkleman, Jo Wood, Martine McCutcheon, JLS, Craig David and Gordon Banks all giving their handprints to support the campaign. It has been over one year since the *Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings* came into force, and ECPAT UK has been monitoring its implementation carefully. In June, ECPAT UK, as a member of the Anti-Trafficking Monitoring Group, published the report 'Wrong Kind of Victim? One year on: an analysis of UK measures to protect trafficked persons'. The report found serious flaws in the National Referral Mechanism for identifying victims of trafficking and declared it 'not fit for purpose'. In February, the All Party Parliamentary Group on Human Trafficking, in partnership with ECPAT UK, staged a major exhibition on human trafficking in Parliament, which was visited by parliamentarians from the UK and abroad, including David Cameron MP.

ECPAT UK is delighted that the Anti-Slavery Day Bill became law in April, meaning that every year a national Anti-Slavery Day will be held on the 18th October. Check our website to keep up to date with activities planned for the first UK Anti-Slavery Day.

ECPAT UK continues to campaign against the sexual exploitation of children in tourism destinations. Whilst there have been some improvements in legislation, there remain serious failures in the implementation of the law. We were disappointed at a recent case dismissal at Bristol Crown Court. The case involved child abuse allegations in India and once again highlighted the need for better coordination between authorities in the UK and abroad.

Despite all our achievements, much more needs to be done to protect children and we need your support. Please see page 7 for what you can do to help make a difference. We hope you will all play your part and take action to combat child exploitation.

# What other work are we doing?

## Influencing

### Anti-Slavery Day

In April a new law was passed to create an annual Anti-Slavery Day in the UK. The Prime Minister, David Cameron, has approved the 18th October as the date of Anti-Slavery Day to coincide with the European Anti-Trafficking Day. Former MP Anthony Steen introduced the initiative as a Private Members' Bill. ECPAT UK worked with Anthony Steen, then Chair of the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) on Human Trafficking, from the inception of the Bill through its passage into law just before the general election.

The Anti-Slavery Day Act (2010) specifically recognises child trafficking as a form of slavery and is supported by a number of organisations campaigning against human trafficking, including Amnesty International and Anti-Slavery International. Anti-Slavery Day will provide an excellent opportunity for ECPAT UK to raise awareness of, and campaign against, child trafficking and exploitation.

We will update you on ECPAT UK activities on the first UK Anti-Slavery Day in the next edition of Connect to Protect.

## Monitoring

### Wrong Kind of Victim?

Since May 2009, ECPAT UK has been a core member of the Anti-Trafficking Monitoring Group, a coalition of organisations working together to promote the best interests of victims of trafficking. The objective of the group is to monitor the implementation of the *Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings* in the UK.

ECPAT UK has been at the forefront of the development of the group, participating in regular meetings, recruiting project staff and providing extensive input into the group's first report *'Wrong Kind of Victim?'*, published in June. ECPAT UK led on children's issues, facilitating input from other children's organisations and working with the APPG on Human Trafficking to submit parliamentary questions to provide evidence for the report.

*'Wrong Kind of Victim?'* questions whether the National Referral Mechanism for identifying victims of trafficking (NRM), introduced on 1 April 2009, offers an effective response to protecting children, as it attempts to fit them into a system designed for adults. The report found the NRM 'not fit for purpose' and that the UK Government is breaching its obligations under the *Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings*.

The report recommends that child victims of trafficking are provided with a legal guardian to ensure that their best interests are always at the forefront of decision-making. It also identifies the lack of safe accommodation as highlighted by the ongoing scandal of children going missing from care.

In response to the report, Damien Green MP, Minister of State for Borders and Immigration, stated:

*"I am very aware that our response to trafficking must be about far more than law enforcement. Identifying and protecting the victims of this terrible crime is part of the coherent approach to trafficking that I intend to pursue... I look forward to working with partners in all sectors to capitalise on every opportunity to make a difference."*

The members of the Anti-Trafficking Monitoring Group are: ECPAT UK, Amnesty International UK, Anti-Slavery International, Helen Bamber Foundation, Immigration Law Practitioners' Association (ILPA), Kalayaan, POPPY Project, TARA and UNICEF UK. The group works closely with the Anti-Trafficking Legal Project (ATLeP). This collaboration allows us to share information and increase our influence with key decision makers.

The Anti-Trafficking Monitoring Group is an ongoing project and ECPAT UK will continue to be a core member of the group, monitoring government progress on implementing the *Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings* and following up on concerns raised in the report.

### Victims' voices ignored

ECPAT UK continues to raise awareness and campaign against the sexual exploitation of children by UK nationals who travel abroad. While the UK has legislation to prosecute these offenders, it is not being used to full effect and very few cases ever get to court.

In June, ECPAT UK was disappointed to see that a case against a former teacher was dismissed at Bristol Crown Court because of failings by the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) to obtain the necessary legal provisions to have the witnesses interviewed in time for trial. The alleged offences dated back to 2005 when he worked as a volunteer in Chennai, India. The charges were brought under the Sexual Offences Act (2003) which allows the UK to prosecute its citizens for sexual offences committed overseas.

The details of the case, obtained by ECPAT UK, show that although the Gloucestershire police investigation was thorough, several years of delays and inaction, both in India and in the UK, caused numerous problems. The Judge refused to adjourn the case and the defendant walked free. The children he is alleged to have abused, who were 8 and 9 years old at the time, had no opportunity to give their evidence at trial.

This verdict shows that there is still a long way to go before the CPS and the Judiciary address the realities of international child sexual abuse in their practice in the UK. ECPAT UK has written to the Director of Public Prosecutions, Keir Starmer QC, to call for an immediate review of this judgement.

## Training

### 'In Your Hands' e-learning course

Following the success of the first ECPAT UK e-learning course on child trafficking, 'In Your Hands', and the subsequent Scottish version, ECPAT UK has been commissioned by the Welsh Assembly Government to produce a version appropriate to Welsh legislation and policy. ## Calling for guardianship for child victims of trafficking

Child victims of trafficking are some of the most vulnerable children in the UK. In addition to having suffered physical, sexual and psychological abuse at the hands of their traffickers, children find themselves alone in the UK without family, leaving them unsupported, unhappy and vulnerable to further exploitation. Returning home is not always in their best interest.

In recent years the UK Government has issued a range of practitioner guidance for safeguarding child victims of trafficking. However, despite these developments there is concern that the level and quality of welfare support provided by local authorities varies widely and is often found to be vastly inadequate. Children are often unaware of their legal rights and entitlements and some authorities go so far as to tell children they cannot afford to provide them with education or safer accommodation.

ECPAT UK values our work with young people and we draw on their recommendations to inform our work. A key message from our conversations with young people is that they want more to be done to make them feel safe and supported. The members of the ECPAT UK Youth Group have given us their quotes for this article.

### "I want just one person I can call anytime"

Child victims of trafficking are often assisted by many professionals, including social workers, police, immigration caseworkers and lawyers, who may not always be in contact with each other, and therefore fail to provide a coordinated network of support. A solution to this would be one responsible adult who can guide children through the complex welfare, legal, asylum and immigration processes.

### "I want to be supported from one service"

With so many statutory services, children find it difficult to understand who is responsible for solving day to day problems. In a crisis, children should be able to rely on one person for help.

### "I need help to go to school and help with my immigration and help with my baby"

Young people have a wide range of support needs, requiring assistance with many different aspects of their lives. Access to these services should be immediate, but often they are not advised of their options and are too frightened to ask. One person to coordinate services and make referrals to appropriate organisations would ensure that all support and care needs are met.

### "I don't like it... I have to explain everything again"

Understandably, child victims of trafficking do not always feel comfortable describing their experiences of exploitation, and often have to repeat their account to a variety of adults such as police, social workers, doctors and lawyers.

Children may feel ashamed, or that no-one will believe them, or they may have been threatened by their traffickers not to tell anyone what has happened to them. This highlights the need for someone in authority to be able to pass relevant information to other statutory agencies with the child's consent. This would prevent the child having to unnecessarily repeat upsetting information.

### "I have no one to talk to who will understand"

Children often feel that no-one will understand what they have been through. People working with young victims of trafficking should always have a full understanding of the complexities of child trafficking, in particular the forms of exploitation experienced by children in the UK.

### "The more time you spend with a person, the more open you can be"

Young people who have been exploited can be wary about trusting adults; their traffickers may have told them not to trust anyone. Building trust with one adult can allow them to speak more openly about their needs and concerns.

### "Because you don't have any family you need someone to talk to, to listen to you"

Being alone in the UK without family or friends means children do not know who will listen to them. Speaking about their experiences to someone they trust can be an important part of helping them to rebuild their lives.

### "I need someone to tell me how to go about things"

Even basic day to day tasks can be challenging for children if they do not speak the language or understand how the systems work. When the information is not readily available from their social worker, young people need someone to advise them on appropriate action to take.

**ECPAT UK believes that a system of guardianship would provide child victims of trafficking with what they need to feel safe and supported in the UK; one dedicated individual who they can trust, who has authority, who understands child trafficking and who acts in their best interest.**

**A guardian is not a foster carer or a social worker; it is someone who can work across statutory services to represent the best interest of the child.**

**A guardian would help children successfully negotiate the complex welfare, legal and immigration systems and access all the services to which they are entitled.**

**A guardian would be the person who would provide continuity as they recover from their ordeal and start to rebuild their life.**



## A step forward in Scotland

ECPAT UK's call for a system of guardianship is consistent with a wider campaign by other children's charities and organisations which are calling for a system of guardianship for all separated children who arrive in the UK.

ECPAT UK has warmly welcomed a pilot guardianship scheme for separated children, including child victims of trafficking, recently launched in Scotland. The Separated Children's Guardianship Pilot is a partnership project by the Scottish Refugee Council, Aberlour Childcare Trust and the Scottish Government, funded by the Big Lottery and the Paul Hamlyn Foundation. Service Manager, Catriona MacSween, explains why the guardianship pilot is so important:

*"The children arrive without their parents in a strange country, often speaking little or no English and find themselves in the care system. There are around 200 such children in Scotland. There is no service working directly with trafficked young people in Scotland and they are often wrongly directed down the asylum route, when in fact they should be immediately treated as victims of trafficking and supported as such."*

Although the Scottish Government supports this pilot programme, the UK Government in Westminster has not been supportive of a system of guardianship for child victims of trafficking. On 8th March 2010, in response to a parliamentary question, Alan Campbell MP (then Parliamentary Under-Secretary for the Home Office) stated:

*"...the Government do not believe that guardians for trafficked children would enhance the protection and support available to trafficked children over and above the existing safeguarding and support arrangements that are in place at a local level. The Government believe that this responsibility should remain with the local authorities who have a statutory duty to ensure that they safeguard and promote the welfare of all children."*

Although ECPAT UK has been campaigning for guardianship over the past few years, the previous government resisted our call. However, ECPAT UK will be meeting with ministers in the new government after the summer parliamentary recess to take this forward before the ECPAT UK/Body Shop petition is presented to the Prime Minister in 2011.

## International Obligations

ECPAT UK firmly believes that the UK should be upholding and promoting children's rights, as set out in the UN Convention of the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). ECPAT UK's call for a system of guardianship for child victims of trafficking is in line with international obligations to protect children.

In 2005 the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child, (the UN treaty monitoring body for the UNCRC), clearly outlined the responsibility of States to provide guardians for unaccompanied and separated children.

*UN Committee on the Rights of the Child General Comment No.6 (2005) – Treatment of Unaccompanied and Separated Children outside their Country of Origin.*

*...States should appoint a guardian or adviser as soon as the unaccompanied or separated child is identified and maintain such guardianship arrangements until the child has either reached the age of majority or has permanently left the territory and/or jurisdiction of the State, in compliance with the Convention and other international obligations.*

ECPAT UK called for a system of guardianship in our 2007 report *'Rights Here, Rights Now: Recommendations for protecting trafficked children'* which we published in partnership with UNICEF UK.

We continue to monitor UK compliance with international treaties, such as the *Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings*. This convention, which the UK Government ratified in December 2008, also calls for a system of guardianship:

*Council of Europe Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings - Article 10.4. As soon as an unaccompanied child is identified as a victim, each Party shall: a) provide for representation of the child by a legal guardian, organisation or authority which shall act in the best interests of that child.*

Monitoring and reporting on how the UK Government is fulfilling its obligations is an essential part of ECPAT UK's work. Despite some progress, the UK has still not ratified the *Council of Europe Convention on the Protection of Children against Sexual Exploitation and Sexual Abuse*, missing an important opportunity to show leadership in the fight against child exploitation.

ECPAT UK was also disappointed to learn that the UK Government has decided not to opt in to the proposed European Directive *'Proposal for a Directive on preventing and combating trafficking in human beings and protecting victims, repealing Framework Decision 2002/629/JHA'*. This new treaty goes further than the previous *Convention on Action against Trafficking in Human Beings*, providing better protection for child victims of trafficking and increased powers to conduct joint investigations between European member states.

# ECPAT UK achievements

## What do ECPAT UK staff do?

In these challenging economic times, budget cuts are affecting the work of charities all across the UK. While ECPAT UK is still going strong with a wide range of projects and activities, we recognise the need to be vigilant. We receive no money from the government and ongoing fundraising is essential to maintain our current levels of staffing and our innovative work.

ECPAT UK is proud of its varied programme of work on child exploitation, focusing on preventative work, protection of victims and prosecution of offenders. Here are examples of some of the work ECPAT UK has carried out in 2010:

The ECPAT UK training programme 'Safeguarding Children' is delivered across the UK, and is managed by **Karen Sizeland**, the new ECPAT UK Training Manager. This important work enables those working with children to identify child victims of trafficking, and teaches them how to take the appropriate steps to protect children from exploitation. The fees we receive from delivering training workshops are a valuable source of income and go straight back into our training programme.

ECPAT UK has been advising the UK All Party Parliamentary Group on Human Trafficking since 2006 and over the past year we have consolidated that relationship in a joint project to raise awareness of child trafficking within parliaments across Europe. The project, coordinated by **Alice Macek**, ECPAT UK Information Officer, brings together parliamentarians and NGOs, many of them ECPAT partners, and other specialist agencies such as police to share good practice and exchange information.

In addition to our training courses for professionals working with children, ECPAT UK also trains youth leaders. ECPAT UK Youth Programme Coordinator, **Debbie Beadle**, recently delivered a series of workshops in Serbia, training youth workers from 12 European countries how to use puppet theatre as an awareness raising and campaigning tool.

In June, ECPAT UK was the only children's NGO to attend the 1st Interpol Global Conference on Trafficking in Human Beings, held in Damascus, Syria. ECPAT UK Director, **Christine Beddoe**, gave a presentation on child trafficking, focusing on the need for better coordination and information sharing between police and NGOs in order to provide support for child victims who are also witnesses in need of protection.

In the run up to the general election **Andrew Howard**, ECPAT UK Campaigns Officer, contacted over 2000 of the prospective parliamentary candidates asking them to complete an online survey about their understanding of child exploitation in the UK. Over 400 completed the survey, of which 38 are now MPs, providing ECPAT UK with potential new supporters in Parliament.

ECPAT UK continues to raise awareness about children exploited overseas by UK sex offenders, and **Hannah Pearce**, ECPAT UK Policy and Advocacy Manager, has been overseeing work encouraging parliamentarians to ask questions on prosecutions, monitoring of travelling sex offenders and foreign travel orders. The responses to these parliamentary questions are informing ongoing research and campaign actions.

The UK All Party Parliamentary Group on Human Trafficking, supported by ECPAT UK, was proud to host an exhibition at Parliament in February. **Ricky McGihon**, ECPAT UK Administrator, helped staff the children's section of the exhibition, explaining the issues of child trafficking in the UK to visiting members of the public, MPs and peers.

ECPAT UK is regularly asked to provide expert witness statements and specific case support both in the immigration and criminal courts. As a result, the courts have a more developed understanding of the relevant aspects of child trafficking or of the context of international sexual offending against children which we hope will provide better protection to children and prosecution of offenders.

## How the Body Shop funds help

Since August 2009, ECPAT UK has been receiving funds from the sales of The Body Shop 'Soft Hands, Kind Heart' hand cream. This income has been essential to support our projects and has allowed us to develop a new ECPAT UK Youth Programme. This is managed by a full time Youth Coordinator who works with young people on a range of projects focusing on children's rights. This programme includes the ECPAT UK Youth Group, a group for young people who have been victims of trafficking.

One of our new projects made possible by the funds received from The Body Shop is the ECPAT UK Peer Support and Mentoring Programme. The ECPAT UK Youth Group identified that it was important for them to talk to others who understand what they are going through and they value the support and advice they have received from members of the group.

This type of support was formalised and structured into the Peer Support and Mentoring Programme, which allows the longer standing members of the group to provide support to the newer members, in addition to the advice they receive from organisations and adult workers.



The Peer Support and Mentoring programme means young people can speak to someone who understands what they are going through.
